

Project Coordination Plan

January 2022



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1.0 PURPOSE OF THE PLAN

To comply with National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requirements and Council on Environmental Quality regulations (40 CFR 1500 et seq.), the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), has initiated an Environmental Assessment (EA) for the U.S. 69 corridor. While not a Federal requirement for an EA, KDOT and FHWA are preparing a coordination plan to establish a schedule and process for coordinating public and agency participation and comment. KDOT anticipates the environmental review process for the U.S. 69 project to move at an accelerated pace and this coordination plan is intended to facilitate necessary coordination in a proactive and timely manner. This coordination plan describes the planned coordination and key milestones for agency and public participation for the project.

2.0 PROJECT BACKGROUND

2.1 Project Location

The proposed project is located within the City of Overland Park in Johnson County, Kansas. The overall study limits begin just south of the W 179th Street and extends north to just north of the 103rd Street interchange. Major roads at interchanges are included within the study area, and include W 103rd Street, College Boulevard, W 119th Street, Blue Valley Parkway, W 135th Street, W 151st Street, W 167th Street, and W 179th Street. Additionally, I-435 at the interchange with U.S. 69 is included. Appendix A contains the project study area map. The overall length is approximately ten miles along U.S. 69.

2.2 Purpose and Need

The proposed project is needed to modernize and expand U.S. 69 between 103rd Street and 179th Street in Overland Park, Kansas. The corridor has become insufficient to meet current and future mobility needs, resulting in worsening safety, reliability and congestion. There is also a need to address the corridor's issues with transportation improvements that offer long-term sustainability and flexibility for all users.

The proposed project is needed to:

- *Improve safety* to address crash frequency and congestion related crashes within the corridor;
- *Reduce congestion* and improve traffic operations to meet existing and future travel



demands:

- *Promote sustainability* by addressing infrastructure condition and ongoing operations and maintenance needs, supporting environmental stewardship, as well as improving long-term traveler reliability;
- Provide flexible choices by promoting a transportation system that accommodates the needs for all users and modes; and
- Accommodate local and regional growth through coordinated transportation improvements consistent with planned and proposed community land use.

2.3 Project History

A previous I-435 & U.S. 69 Environmental Assessment (EA) with a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) was prepared in 2004 for the northern portion of the U.S. 69 Corridor study area from just north of 95th Street to the south to just east of Antioch Road. The proposed action included adding additional lane capacity, reconfiguring interchanges and constructing a new interchange at I-435 and Antioch Road. The purpose and need as it pertains to U.S. 69 was to relieve congestion and traffic levels of service, improve roadway deficiencies, improve safety and provide enhanced access to major employment centers. As an outcome of the approved 2004 EA/FONSI, U.S. 69 was widened and reconstructed from I-35 to I-435; the U.S. 69 interchanges with 103rd Street, College Boulevard, 119th Street and I-435 were modified and reconfigured; and a collector-distributor road network was constructed along southbound U.S. 69 between I-435 and 119th Street.

The 2018 U.S. 69 Corridor Concept Study, prepared by the City of Overland Park, investigated the current and future safety and operational needs in the U.S. 69 Corridor from 179th Street to 103rd Street. This study considered alternatives for the future widening and upgrade of the corridor. In 2020, a U.S. 69 Pre-Planning Study was conducted by the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT), the City of Overland Park and the Kansas Turnpike Authority (KTA) to evaluate the potential for tolling in the corridor using an express toll lanes concept. This sketch-level planning study concluded that electronic tolling is technically feasible, and that toll revenue collected could be used to offset the cost to design, construct, operate and maintain the new lanes on U.S. 69. However, the study does not authorize toll lanes or their construction and more extensive analysis on the feasibility of the proposed express toll lanes and their environmental clearance is required prior to moving forward into design and construction.



3.0 INITIAL COORDINATION

KDOT formally notified the FHWA of its intent to initiate the NEPA process as an EA for this project in September 2020.

3.1 Notice of Intent

After project initiation, KDOT, in coordination with FHWA, prepared a Notice of Intent (NOI) to prepare an EA. The NOI was published in the Kansas Register on November 5, 2020. A copy is included in Appendix B. This was the first step in the agency and public coordination process for the project.

3.2 Initial Coordination Package

KDOT, in coordination with FHWA, prepared an initial coordination packet for distribution to agencies, tribes, officials and organizations identified in Table 1 in Section 3.2.4. This packet was sent to agencies November 2, 2020. This packet includes a letter inviting the agency to coordinate on the project, a project description detailing the project and a project study area map. The letter identifies the initial purpose and need for the project, details the history of the project, provides a summary of preliminary alternatives to be considered, and examples of environmental resources that will be considered throughout the course of the EA.

The study team also scheduled a virtual meeting with resource agencies on December 2, 2020 to review the project. The initial coordination packet and meeting are meant to fulfill the scoping activities point of collaboration. **Appendix C** contains copies of response letters received from the agencies during the initial coordination process.

3.1.1 <u>Lead Agencies</u>

KDOT will serve as the lead state agency for the project. FHWA will serve as the lead federal agency. The City of Overland Park and the Kansas Turnpike Authority (KTA) are also serving as planning partners during the study process. The environmental review, consultation and other actions as required by Federal law for this project will be carried out by KDOT and FHWA.

KDOT, in cooperation with FHWA, will:

- Identify cooperating and participating agencies in the environmental review process;
- Develop a coordination plan;
- Develop a public involvement plan;
- Solicit input on the project's purpose and need from the public and agencies;
- Finalize the purpose and need statement;



- Prepare and approve a Draft EA;
- Provide the public and agencies opportunities to offer input on alternatives and the Draft EA;
- Select the Proposed Action (Preferred Alternative);
- Prepare and approve a Final EA and a potential Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI);
- Ensure environmental commitments are completed; and
- Manage the environmental review process and address/resolve any potential issues.

3.1.2 Cooperating Agencies

Cooperating agencies are those governmental agencies specifically requested by the lead agency to participate during the environmental evaluation process for the project. Cooperating agencies are federal agencies that have jurisdiction by law regarding aspects of the proposed project or special expertise pertaining to the project. KDOT, in coordination with FHWA, has determined that there will be no cooperating agencies for this project.

If new information reveals the need to request any agencies to serve as a cooperating agency, then KDOT in consultation with FHWA will issue that agency an invitation.

3.1.3 Participating Agencies

These are federal and non-federal governmental agencies that may have an interest in the project because of their jurisdictional authority, special expertise and/or statewide interest. All federal, state, regional and local government agencies that may have an interest in the project are being invited to serve as participating agencies. Non-governmental organizations and private entities cannot serve as participating agencies.

For the U.S. 69 EA, Federal, State, tribal, regional, and local government agencies that may have an interest in the project were invited to serve as participating agencies. Appendix C contains copies of the invitation letters to participating agencies which were included in the initial coordination package. Participating agencies are listed in section 3.2.4.

The roles and responsibilities of participating agencies include, but are not limited to:

- Participate in the scoping process;
- Participate in the NEPA process by providing input on the development of the purpose and need statement, and alternative screening process; and



- Identifying, as early as practicable, any issues of concern regarding the project's potential environmental or socioeconomic impacts. Participating agencies also may participate in the issue resolution process.
- Reviewing and providing comment on the EA.

If, during the progress of the project, new information indicates that an agency not previously requested to be a participating agency does indeed have authority, jurisdiction, acknowledged expertise or information relevant to the project, then KDOT, in consultation with FHWA, will promptly extend an invitation to that agency to be a participating agency.

Accepting the designation as a participating agency does not indicate project support and does not provide an agency with increased oversight or approval authority beyond its statutory limits, if applicable. Cooperating agencies are, by definition, participating agencies, but not all participating agencies are cooperating agencies. The roles and responsibilities of cooperating and participating agencies are very similar, but cooperating agencies have a slightly higher degree of authority, responsibility, and involvement in the environmental review process.

Comment periods for the public or participating agencies will not exceed 30 days unless a different comment period is established by the study team, lead agency, and all participating agencies.

4.0 COORDINATION POINTS

Lead agencies (KDOT and FHWA) for the project must agree that the project may move forward at key points including the agency coordination plan, purpose and need, range of alternatives and proposed action (preferred alternative), preliminary Draft EA, and combined Final EA/FONSI.

Participating agencies may be asked to review deliverables and provide feedback at collaboration points. The study team will address comments received from participating agencies before finalizing documents for official approval.

The lead agency (KDOT) will ensure information is presented to participating agencies at key points throughout the project through coordination. An agreed upon amount of time will be provided for agencies to review and submit feedback; this will typically be 30 days from receipt of the materials. Key coordination points for this project and anticipated dates for coordination are shown in Table 2. Appendix D contains letters and responses for each coordination point during the project.






Figure 3: Project Schedule



The proposed permit is to reissue an existing State/NPDES permit for an existing facility. This facility uses grain (primarily corn and milo) to manufacture ethanol via natural fermentation. The resulting products include 190 and 200 proof ethanol, animal feed, and CO2. A portion of the effluent is sent to an onsite decorative pond and plant site irrigation. Domestic wastewater is connected to a septic tank lateral field system. The proposed permit contains limits for total residual chlorine and pH, as well as monitoring for flow, sulfate, total recoverable metals, arsenic, fluoride, total recoverable selenium, and biological oxygen demand.

Persons wishing to comment on the draft documents and/or permit applications must submit their comments in writing to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment if they wish to have the comments considered in the decision-making process. Comments should be submitted to the attention of the Livestock Waste Management Section for agricultural related draft documents or applications, or to the Technical Services Section for all other permits, at the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Division of Environment, Bureau of Water, 1000 SW Jackson St., Suite 420, Topeka, KS 66612-1367.

All comments regarding the draft documents or application notices received on or before December 5, 2020, will be considered in the formulation of the final determinations regarding this public notice. Please refer to the appropriate Kansas document number (KS-AG-20-236/245, KS-Q-20-182/193) and name of the applicant/permittee when preparing comments.

After review of any comments received during the public notice period, the Secretary of Health and Environment will issue a determination regarding final agency action on each draft document/application. If response to any draft document/application indicates significant public interest, a public hearing may be held in conformance with K.A.R. 28-16-61 (28-46-21 for UIC).

All draft documents/applications and the supporting information including any comments received are on file and may be inspected at the offices of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Water, 1000 SW Jackson St., Suite 420, Topeka, Kansas. Notice of Intent to Conduct Environmental Assessment

Public notice is hereby given that the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT), in cooperation with the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), will prepare an Environmental Assessment (EA) for a proposal to modernize and expand the U.S. 69 Corridor located in Johnson County, Kansas. The City of Overland Park and the Kansas Turnpike Authority are serving as partners on the study.

The overall environmental study limits begin just south of W. 179th Street and extend to just north of 103rd Street. The overall length is approximately ten miles. Major roads at interchanges are included within the environmental study area, including W. 103rd Street, College Boulevard, W. 119th Street, Blue Valley Parkway, W. 135th Street, W. 151st Street, W. 167th Street, and W. 179th Street. Additionally, I-435 at the interchange with U.S. 69 is included.

Within the EA, FHWA and KDOT will evaluate a "No Action" alternative as well as modernization and expansion alternatives, including a toll alternative as the proposed action. The toll alternative will evaluate the potential benefits of express toll lanes for north and southbound traffic to improve safety and improve congestion in the corridor. Roadway and interchange configurations will be evaluated throughout the corridor.

The FHWA and KDOT plan to prepare an EA for the project. The EA will analyze the potential social, economic, and environmental impacts resulting from the proposed project. The following issues will be specifically analyzed as part of the EA: impacts to the aquatic ecosystem; impacts to cultural resources; impacts to threatened and endangered species; impacts to floodplains; impacts to transportation; impacts to parks/recreation; environmental justice; and socioeconomics. This includes direct, indirect, and cumulative impacts. Other federal approvals or permits that may be required; a Section 404 Permit from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), a floodplain development permit from the City of Overland Park as well as water resource, and floodplain permits from the Kansas Division of Water Resources.

This letter is in response to your letter of advisement for an Environmental Assessment process initiated for planned work along an approximate 10 mile length of U.S. 69 Highway in Johnson County, Kansas. It was received for on November 5, 2020. The proposed project involves improvements to the highway between 103rd and 179th Streets, that will involve the placement of fill materials within waters of the U.S. along the route.

Your project has been assigned permit file number NWK-2020-948. All activities requiring a permit are given a thorough public interest review, which includes a detailed evaluation of the potential effects on the environment. The Corps of Engineers has jurisdiction over all waters of the United States. Discharges of dredged or fill material in waters of the United States, including wetlands, require prior authorization from the Corps under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act (33 USC 1344). The implementing regulation for this Act is found at 33 C.F.R. 320-332.

We have reviewed the information for the proposed Environmental Assessment for the U.S. 69 Corridor, Johnson County, KS. The project was reviewed for potential impacts on crucial wildlife habitats, current statelisted threatened and endangered species and species in need of conservation, and Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks, and Tourism managed areas for which this agency has administrative authority.

We provide the following comments and general recommendations, when applicable:

- Avoid impacts to existing streams and rivers, adjacent riparian zones, wetlands, and native prairie and woodland areas.
- Minimize all bank or instream activity, particularly during general fish spawning season (March 1 Aug. 31).

We have reviewed the information for the proposed preliminary comments for the U.S. 69 Highway expansion project in Johnson County, KS. The project was reviewed for potential impacts on crucial wildlife habitats, current state-listed threatened and endangered species and species in need of conservation, and Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks, and Tourism managed areas for which this agency has administrative authority.

We provide the following comments and general recommendations, when applicable:

- Avoid impacts to existing streams and rivers, adjacent riparian zones, wetlands, and native prairie and woodland areas.
- Minimize all bank or instream activity, particularly during general fish spawning season (March 1 Aug. 31).
- Incorporate principles of low impact development (LID), such as permeable asphalt pavement, porous concrete, swales, bioretention, or raingardens. More info. on LID: http://www.epa.gov/owow/NPS/lid/
- Implement and maintain standard erosion-control Best-Management-Practices during all aspects of construction by installing sediment barriers (wattles, filter logs, rock ditch checks, mulching, or any combination of these) across the entire construction area to prevent sediment and spoil from entering aquatic systems. This letter is in response to your request for comments regarding alternatives for the U.S. 69 Express Environmental Assessment. The planned work would occur along an approximate 10-mile length of U.S. 69 Highway in Johnson County, Kansas between 103^{rd} Street and 179^{th} Street. The proposed project involves improvements to the highway that may involve the placement of fill materials within waters of the U.S. along the route.

The Corps of Engineers has jurisdiction over all waters of the United States. Discharges of dredged or fill material in waters of the United States, including wetlands, require prior authorization from the Corps under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act (33 USC 1344). The implementing regulation for this Act is found at 33 CFR 320-332.

We have reviewed the Alternatives Memo for this project, sent for our review on October 4, 2021, and have no objections or concerns regarding the alternatives screening process for the project as outlined in that document. We will further evaluate the project for permit consideration when an application and the impacts of the proposed work to waters of the U.S. within the highway corridor have been submitted for the work associated with the project.

The Eastern Shawnee Tribe has received your letter regarding the above referenced project(s) within Johnson County, Kansas. The Eastern Shawnee Tribe is committed to protecting sites important to Tribal Heritage, Culture and Religion. Furthermore, the Tribe is particularly concerned with historical sites that may contain but not limited to the burial(s) of human remains and associated funerary objects.

As described in your correspondence, and upon research of our database(s) and files, we find our people occupied these areas historically and/or prehistorically. However, the project proposes **NO Adverse Effect** or endangerment to known sites of interest to the Eastern Shawnee Tribe. Please continue project as planned. However, should this project inadvertently discover an archeological site or object(s) we request that you immediately contact the Eastern Shawnee Tribe, as well as the appropriate state agencies (within 24 hours). We also ask that all ground disturbing activity stop until the Tribe and State agencies are consulted. Please note that any future changes to this project will require additional consultation.

In accordance with the NHPA of 1966 (16 U.S.C. § 470-470w-6), federally funded, licensed, or permitted undertakings that are subject to the Section 106 review process must determine effects to significant historic properties. As clarified in Section 101(d)(6)(A-B), historic properties may have religious and/or cultural significance to Indian Tribes. Section 106 of NHPA requires Federal agencies to consider the effects of their actions on all significant historic properties (36 CFR Part 800) as does the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (43 U.S.C. § 4321-4347 and 40 CFR § 1501.7(a). This letter evidences NHPA and NEPA historic properties compliance pertaining to consultation with this Tribe regarding the referenced proposed projects.

Airspace Considerations

The project may require formal notice and review for airspace considerations under 14 CFR Part 77, Safe, Efficient Use, and Preservation of the Navigable Airspace. To determine if you need to file with FAA, go to http://oeaaa.faa.gov and click on the "Notice Criteria Tool" found at the left-hand side of the page.

Several items may need to be checked such as any structures, towers, poles, objects, and temporary construction equipment that exceed the notice criteria. For projects involving long routes, multiple locations will need to be checked. We recommend checking the route at 1-mile intervals and at increases in elevation.

If after using the tool, you determine that filing with FAA is required, we recommend a 120-day notification to accommodate the review process and issue our determination letter. Steve Rockers,

We have reviewed the Environmental Assessment (EA) for the proposed U.S. 69 Modernization and Expansion Project ("69 Express") to occur in Overland Park, Johnson County, Kansas. Project details were reviewed for potential impacts to critical wildlife habitats, current state-listed threatened or endangered species and species in need of conservation, as well as Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks managed areas for which this agency has administrative authority.

We understand the preferred construction alternative will construct express toll lanes along the existing U.S. Highway 69 corridor to improve travel service. The EA indicates minor impacts to parks and recreation facilities may occur. We note that some impacts may occur to native deciduous forests. If avoidance of forest clearing is infeasible, we encourage the project sponsors to offset lost forested acreage. We also provide the following comments and general recommendations. When applicable:

 Avoid impacts to existing streams and rivers, adjacent riparian zones, wetlands, and native prairie and woodland areas.

- Minimize all bank or instream activity, particularly during general fish spawning season (March 1 – Aug. 31).
- Incorporate principles of low impact development (LID), such as permeable asphalt pavement, porous concrete, swales, bioretention, or raingardens. More info on LID: https://www.epa.gov/nps/urban-runoff-low-impact-development.
- Implement and maintain standard erosion control Best Management Practices during
 all aspects of construction by installing sediment barriers (wattles, filter logs, rock
 check ditches, mulching, or any combination of these) across the entire construction
 area to prevent sediment and spoil from entering aquatic systems. Barriers should be
 maintained at high functioning capacity until construction is completed and
 vegetation is established. For more information on erosion BMPs go
 to: http://www.kdheks.gov/stormwater/#construct.
- Reseed disturbed areas with native warm-season grasses, forbs, and trees.

Results of our review indicate there will be no significant impacts to crucial wildlife habitats; therefore, no special mitigation measures are recommended. The project will not impact any public recreational areas, nor could we document any potential impacts to currently-listed threatened or endangered species or species in need of conservation. No Department of Wildlife and Parks permits or special authorizations will be needed if construction is started within one year, and no design changes are made in the project plans. Permits may still be required from other agencies. We recommend consultation with all other applicable regulatory authorities which, among others, may include Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Kansas Department of Agriculture-Division of Water Resources, and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Since the Department's recreational land obligations and the State's species listings periodically change, if construction has not started within one year of this date, or if design changes are made in the project plans, the project sponsor must contact this office to verify continued applicability of this assessment report. For our purposes, we consider construction started when advertisements for bids are distributed.



Construction and Demolition (C&D) waste is solid waste generated during construction or demolition activities. Clean rubble is also generated during construction or demolition activities, but it differs in composition from C&D waste. This document explains the definitions of C&D waste and clean rubble and acceptable methods for disposal of both.

Construction and Demolition Waste

Definition of C&D waste

C&D waste is defined in KSA 65-3402 (u) as:

- solid waste resulting from the construction, remodeling, repair and demolition of structures, roads, sidewalks and utilities;
- untreated wood and untreated sawdust from any source;
- treated wood from construction or demolition projects;
- small amounts of municipal solid waste generated by the consumption of food and drinks at construction or demolition sites, including, but not limited to, cups, bags and bottles;
- furniture and appliances from which ozone depleting chlorofluorocarbons have been removed in accordance with the provisions of the federal clean air act;
- · solid waste consisting of motor vehicle window glass; and
- · solid waste consisting of vegetation from land clearing and grubbing, utility maintenance, and seasonal or storm related cleanup.

Such wastes include, but are not limited to, bricks, concrete, and other masonry materials, roofing materials, soil, rock, wood, wood products, wall or floor coverings, plaster, drywall, plumbing fixtures, electrical wiring, electrical components containing no hazardous materials, non-asbestos insulation and construction related packaging.

Other statutes and regulations further refine the definition:

Construction related packaging means small quantities of packaging wastes that are generated in the construction, remodeling or repair of structures and related appurtenances. "Construction related packaging" does not include packaging wastes that are generated at retail establishments selling construction materials, chemical containers generated from any source or packaging generated during maintenance of existing structures. KSA 65-3402(dd)

Furniture and appliances do not include computer monitors and other computer components, televisions, videocassette recorders, stereos, and similar waste electronics. KAR 28-29-300(a)(4)(A)

Treated wood includes wood treated with any of the following:

- (i) Creosote:
- (ii) oil-borne preservatives, including pentachlorophenol and copper naphthenate;

- (iii) waterborne preservatives, including chromated copper arsenate (CCA), ammoniacal copper zinc arsenate (ACZA), and ammoniacal copper quaternary compound (ACQ); or
- (iv) any other chemical that poses risks to human health and the environment that are similar to the risks posed by the chemicals specified in paragraphs (i) through (iii). KAR 28-29-300(a)(4)(B)

<u>Untreated wood</u> includes the following, if the wood has not been treated with any of the chemicals listed in the definition of <u>treated wood</u>:

- (i) Coated wood, including wood that has been painted, stained, or varnished; and
- (ii) engineered wood, including plywood, laminated wood, oriented-strand board, and particle board. KAR 28-29-300(a)(4)(C)

Wastes which may be disposed of in a C&D landfill

In addition to the items *explicitly* identified as C&D waste in KSA 65-3402 (u), the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) considers the following materials as *acceptable* for disposal in a C&D landfill:

- 1. Uncontaminated wooden pallets;
- 2. Street sweepings (litter must be removed and concentrations of metals, volatile organic compounds, and other compounds must be below regulatory levels);
- 3. Floor tile, siding, and roofing material containing non-friable asbestos. This material should be:
 - a. handled so it remains non-friable (e.g., may have to be manually removed prior to demolition of structure);
 - b. transported wet (covered with a mist spray to suppress dust) or transported with tarp cover; and
 - c. covered immediately at the landfill;
- 4. Trees, brush, sod, and incidental quantities of leaves and grass;
- 5. Ash and other residues from the burning of trees and brush (trees and brush must have been burned in accordance with KAR 28-19-647);
- 6. Metal scrap (e.g. tie strapping);
- 7. Mobile homes and trailers (except the tires and fuel tanks). KDHE encourages the recycling of metal components.

Dry mud trap solids from commercial car washes may be applied as cover at a C&D landfill. To be considered a solid the material must pass the paint filter test, EPA method SW 846/9095.

Wastes which may not be disposed of in a C&D landfill

Construction and demolition waste does not include waste material containing friable asbestos, garbage, appliances from which ozone depleting chlorofluorocarbons have not been removed in accordance with the provisions of the federal clean air act, electrical equipment containing hazardous materials, tires, drums and containers even though such wastes resulted from construction and demolition activities.

KSA 65-3402(u)

In addition to the items *explicitly* identified as <u>not</u> being C&D waste, KDHE considers the following wastes *unacceptable* for disposal in a C&D landfill:

- 1. Processed tires i.e. cut or baled;
- 2. Mud trap wastes from businesses other than commercial car washes;
- 3. Bagged or bulk quantities of leaves and/or grass clippings;
- 4. Trash bags, unless demonstrated to contain only acceptable wastes.

Disposal options for C&D wastes

Acceptable C&D wastes may be disposed of in either a municipal solid waste landfill (MSWLF) or in a C&D landfill. Both MSWLFs and C&D landfills must be approved by KDHE through a permit process. But because of the relatively inert nature of the wastes disposed in C&D landfills, these landfills do not have to meet design standards as strict as those for MSWLFs.

Most C&D landfills will, on occasion, receive waste that is not appropriate for disposal. Therefore, all C&D landfills should conduct waste screening (i.e., inspect incoming waste and remove unacceptable materials) and maintain a dumpster or roll-off container onsite for unacceptable wastes which are received at the landfill. Waste screening is covered in Technical Guidance Document SW 02-01, and storage of unapproved wastes screened from construction and demolition landfills is addressed in Bureau of Waste Management Policy 02-01.

Clean Rubble

Definition of clean rubble

According to KSA 65-3402 (w), "Clean rubble means the following types of construction and demolition waste: concrete and concrete products including reinforcing steel, asphalt pavement, brick, rock and uncontaminated soil as defined in rules and regulations adopted by the secretary."

KSA 65-3415b lists "clean rubble" as a waste which is exempt from the state solid waste tonnage fee. The definition of "construction and demolition waste" in KSA 65-3402(u) states: "Clean rubble that is mixed with other construction and demolition waste <u>during demolition or transportation</u> shall be considered to be construction and demolition waste."

Clean rubble that is brought separately to a construction and demolition landfill or a municipal solid waste landfill is <u>not</u> subject to the tonnage fee, even if the clean rubble is mixed with construction and demolition waste or municipal solid waste upon disposal.

Disposal of clean rubble

The stable nature of the materials in clean rubble means it may be disposed of with C&D waste, or it may be disposed of separately at a clean rubble site. However, clean rubble that is mixed with other C&D waste during demolition or transportation is considered to be C&D waste and must be disposed of at either a MSWLF or at a C&D landfill.

Unlike a C&D landfill, state statutes do not require a solid waste permit for operation of a site that accepts only clean rubble. However, a clean rubble site may be subject to local city or county requirements such as local approval (zoning or land use) and local ordinances.

Approval from the Division of Water Resources (DWR) may be required if the site is located in the 100-year flood plain. The operation and appearance of the site must not create a public nuisance or adversely affect the public health or the environment.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment Bureau of Environmental Remediation (KDHE/BER), Assessment and Restoration Section, Dry Cleaner / Superfund Unit, has not identified contaminated Superfund sites within the vicinity of the proposed project.

The following dry cleaner sites have been identified within the study area of the project: Pride Cleaners #1031 (C5-081-70782) located at 10372 Mastin St

• This Site is located within the study area, approximately 220 ft from US-69. One soil sample was collected on the western side of the building that contained PCE and TCE above the Kansas Soil-to-Groundwater Pathway RSK (121 ug/kg and 84.2 ug/kg respectively) 2-3 ft below ground surface (bgs). Groundwater is also contaminated with tetrachloroethylene (PCE), Trichloroethylene (TCE), and Vinyl Chloride (VC) above MCL on the western border of the Site (on the highway side) and TCE and VC above MCL on the eastern side. Groundwater depth was eight (8) feet or greater below top of temporary piezometer casing. Depending on the final design and area of work, soil contamination from this Site may impact the project. Groundwater contamination is not expected to impact the project.

Pride Cleaners #26 (C4-046-72122) located at 7940 W 151st St

• This Site is located 437 ft from the highway and 336 ft from a highway off-ramp. Soil contaminated with TCE above the Soil-to-Groundwater RSK has been confirmed 1-2 ft (bgs) underneath the former building. Depending on the final design and area of work, soil contamination from this Site could impact the project; however, based on the plan maps dated June 2021, impact from this site is unlikely.

The following dry cleaner site has been identified proximate to the study area: Pride 1040 (C4-046-72987) located at 8748 W. 135th St

Several items may need to be checked such as any structures, towers, poles, objects, and temporary construction equipment that exceed the notice criteria. For projects involving long routes, multiple locations will need to be checked. We recommend checking the route at 1-mile intervals and at increases in elevation.

If after using the tool, you determine that filing with FAA is required, we recommend a 120-day notification to accommodate the review process and issue our determination letter. Proposals may be filed at http://oeaaa.faa.gov. More information on this process may be found at: http://www.faa.gov/airports/central/engineering/part77/

We have reviewed the information for the proposed U.S. 69 Modernization and Expansion Project, 69 Express, in Overland Park, Johnson County, Kansas. The project was reviewed for potential impacts to critical wildlife habitats, current state-listed threatened or endangered species and species in need of conservation, as well as Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks managed areas for which this agency has administrative authority.

We understand the preferred construction alternative will construct express toll lanes along the existing U.S. Highway 69 corridor to improve travel service. The EA indicates minor impacts to parks and recreation facilities may occur. We note that some impacts may occur to native deciduous forests. If avoidance of forest clearing is infeasible, we encourage the project sponsors to offset lost forested acreage. We also provide the following comments and general recommendations. When applicable:

- Avoid impacts to existing streams and rivers, adjacent riparian zones, wetlands, and native prairie and woodland areas.
- Minimize all bank or instream activity, particularly during general fish spawning season (March 1 Aug. 31).
- Incorporate principles of low impact development (LID), such as permeable asphalt pavement, porous concrete, swales, bioretention, or raingardens. More info on LID: https://www.epa.gov/nps/urban-runoff-low-impact-development.
- Implement and maintain standard erosion control Best Management Practices during all aspects of
 construction by installing sediment barriers (wattles, filter logs, rock check ditches, mulching, or any
 combination of these) across the entire construction area to prevent sediment and spoil from
 entering aquatic systems. Barriers should be maintained at high functioning capacity until
 construction is completed and vegetation is established. For more information on erosion BMPs go
 to: http://www.kdheks.gov/stormwater/#construct.
- Reseed disturbed areas with native warm-season grasses, forbs, and trees.

Results of our review indicate there will be no significant impacts to crucial wildlife habitats; therefore, no special mitigation measures are recommended. The project will not impact any public recreational areas, nor could we document any potential impacts to currently-listed threatened or endangered species or species in need of conservation. No Department of Wildlife and Parks permits or special authorizations will be needed if construction is started within one year, and no design changes are made in the project plans. Permits may still

be required from other agencies. We recommend consultation with all other applicable regulatory authorities which, among others, may include Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Kansas Department of Agriculture-Division of Water Resources, and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Since the Department's recreational land obligations and the State's species listings periodically change, if construction has not started within one year of this date, or if design changes are made in the project plans, the project sponsor must contact this office to verify continued applicability of this assessment report. For our purposes, we consider construction started when advertisements for bids are distributed.

However, the project proposes **NO Adverse Effect** or endangerment to known sites of interest to the Eastern Shawnee Tribe. Please continue project as planned. However, should this project inadvertently discover an archeological site or object(s) we request that you immediately contact the Eastern Shawnee Tribe, as well as the appropriate state agencies (within 24 hours). We also ask that all ground disturbing activity stop until the Tribe and State agencies are consulted. Please note that any future changes to this project will require additional consultation.

In accordance with the NHPA of 1966 (16 U.S.C. § 470-470w-6), federally funded, licensed, or permitted undertakings that are subject to the Section 106 review process must determine effects to significant historic properties. As clarified in Section 101(d)(6)(A-B), historic properties may have religious and/or cultural significance to Indian Tribes. 1.0 Project Description

The U.S. 69 Modernization and Expansion will include improvements to the U.S. 69 Corridor between 179th Street and 103rd Streets in Johnson County, Kansas. The Project – now branded as 69Express - will utilize a competitive Design-Build alternative delivery model to maximize project scope within an anticipated \$300M construction budget and expedite delivery. Its improvements are anticipated to include:

- Capacity improvements between 179th and 95th Streets;
- Arterial turn-lane and ramp improvements at the 179th Street, 167th Street, 151st Street, 135th
 Street, 119th Street, College Boulevard and 103rd Street service interchanges;
- Ramp improvements at Blue Valley Parkway and I-435 system-to-system interchanges; and
- Existing infrastructure replacement (pavement, bridge, signs, lighting, etc.).

2.0 Situational Assessment

Safety and congestion issues have been identified along U.S. 69 in a series of studies and related projects conducted over the last 25 years. During that time, commuters and travelers have grown increasingly frustrated with higher accident rates, growing congestion and increasing travel times. The problem is only expected to increase. As development continues, traffic volume is projected to double, and travel times are projected to triple by 2045. Not surprisingly, U.S. 69 improvements were identified as the metropolitan area's most important priority during local consult meetings held across the State of Kansas in 2019.

As one of the state's busiest highway segment, U.S. 69 faces challenges in terms of consistently delivering safe, efficient and predictable travel. The corridor:

- Experiences crash rates 53% above the statewide average;
- Averages one crash every 3 days;
- Has existing pavement and bridges that are approximately 50 years old; and
- Is expected to see peak travel times triple by 2040.

The local community shares a widespread, non-technical understanding of the challenges confronting the corridor, as evidenced by the previously submitted results of a series of elected/civic leader interviews, a statistically valid community survey and input from the Project Advisory Group:

- Improving traffic flow on U.S. 69 is the #1 issue for residents;
- 9 of 10 residents think it is important to make improvements to U.S. 69;
- 62% are concerned about travel safety on U.S. 69; and
- 59% are concerned about travel time predictability.

These findings indicate engagement activities will take place in a communication environment in which stakeholders generally believe:



- The need to improve U.S. 69 is undeniable and the sooner that need is met, the better.
- COVID-19 hasn't diminished the need for expansion.
- Support is most likely to be found around improvements that benefit quality of life and safety.
- Express toll lanes may be the right solution, but questions remain about why specifically they are needed on U.S. 69 and how they will operate.
- Broad-based communication about the Project and potential solution strategies are needed, with a
 reliance on trusted information sources such as KDOT, the City of Overland Park, employers and
 membership groups.

However, Project engagement also must assist stakeholders in understanding that:

- Like other projects, U.S. 69 moves out of the Project Development Pipeline for the <u>Eisenhower</u>
 <u>Legacy Transportation Program</u> (IKE) into construction using a combination of Kansas taxpayer funds
 from the State Highway Fund and one or more of three strategies in partnership with KDOT: (1)
 provide a local contribution; (2) phase the project (build different portions over time); and (3)
 negotiate the scope of the project to better fit available taxpayer funding.
- Local contributions are funds and other things of value that cities, counties and sometimes the private sector provide to help advance important infrastructure projects. Over the course of the past two decades, for example, Overland Park has contributed about 20 percent of the total cost to advance work on U.S. 69 and I-435. On U.S. 69, a 20 percent local contribution without tolling would range from \$60 million to \$109 million depending upon which alternative among those identified in previous studies is built.
- Kansas has many serious transportation needs that must be addressed, and state funding is limited.
 State dollars will be a significant source of funding used to improve U.S. 69, but local contributions help advance important projects more quickly and help ensure that such projects more fully meet local transportation needs. Additionally, from a driver standpoint, offering a less-congested alternative for travel where none previously existed provides the driving public with choice.

3.0 Public Involvement Goals

Based on KDOT guidance and the situational assessment conducted in Phase 1, the public involvement goals in Phase 2 are:

- 1. Provide welcoming, convenient and meaningful participation opportunities to stakeholders and other interested parties.
- 2. Explain why the Project is being undertaken, its decision-making process, potential solution strategies under consideration and final choices made.
- 3. Gather and assess stakeholder U.S. 69-related experiences and perceptions of corridor quality of life (especially travel predictability and reliability), safety, roadway conditions and other considerations (equity, environment and other).
- 4. Secure actionable input from stakeholders regarding potential improvements and their relative importance.



- 5. Make clear that express toll lanes are being explored as an alternative that potentially gets the Project done faster and manages congestion longer than other alternatives examined in earlier studies;
- 6. Assist in determining how the Project's local contribution can be raised to help advance the Project;
- 7. Report on project progress and decisions, demonstrating how input did or not shape improvements and why; and
- 8. Support and leverage the Project Communication Plan being implemented by KDOT.

4.0 Key Stakeholders and Target Audiences

This program will engage key audiences throughout the project and includes Project Sponsors, Elected Officials (city, county and state), Corporate and Community Stakeholders, Corridor Users, the Media, and others. Key Audiences are defined for purposes of this Plan as individuals and groups that meet one or more of the following criteria:

- 4.1 Plays a direct role in decision-making to advance or approve a City of Overland Park ETL proposal;
- 4.2 Influences the decision-making to advance or approve a City of Overland Park ETL proposal;
- 4.3 Employs or attracts large numbers of people who travel in or through the Corridor to access employment, amenities or attractions;
- 4.4 Depends on the Corridor to provide or distribute goods and services; and/or
- 4.5 Experiences changes in economic vitality or quality of life based on how well U.S. 69 is maintained and operated.

5.0 Key Messages

Key messages are found in the intersection between the:

- Current situation what conditions are on the ground that affect content and stakeholder reception
 of content;
- Project goals what are we trying to achieve organizationally; and
- Audiences what information people need and want to act in ways that advance Project goals.

Based on the preceding plan analysis, engagement tools and activities will convey the following messages clearly and consistently to advance the Project and to achieve goals outlined in **Section 4.0**:

- 5.1 U.S. 69 is critically important to the quality of life, safety and economic vitality of Kansas and the City of Overland Park.
- 5.2 The highway's aging design and infrastructure more than 50 years old can't keep up with the increasing local and regional demands being put on it.



- 5.3 Congestion will double and travel times in the corridor will triple over the next 25 years without significant improvements and management strategies.
- 5.4 Increasing demands put on the corridor will not be reduced over the next 20 years or more as a result of COVID-19, connected or autonomous vehicles, or other foreseeable economic, technologic or demographic changes.
- 5.5 Without a reliable source of revenue for the local contribution for the Project such as express toll lanes U.S. 69 improvements may be fewer in number and take years longer to build.
- 5.6 Express toll lanes empowers motorists to better manage their Corridor travel times and experiences by letting them choose between paying a user fee for access to express lanes or using the untolled general purpose lanes.
- 5.7 All motorists benefit from express toll lanes by experiencing less congestion in all lanes.
- 5.8 Project decision-making will reflect technical requirements as well as stakeholder U.S. 69-related experiences and perceptions of corridor quality of life (especially travel predictability and reliability), safety, roadway conditions and other considerations (equity, environment and other).

6.0 Strategies

The following strategies underpin the planning and implementation of engagement activities described in **Section 7.0 – Tactics** and describe how tactics will be implemented in order to achieve key performance indicators (KPIs).

- 6.1 Engage corridor stakeholders frequently and in multiple formats to ensure that they are and feel heard regarding U.S. 69 needs and opportunities.
- 6.2 Help stakeholders understand the need for a local contribution in the Project deployment and what benefits and trade-offs exist as a result of decisions made about the Project and its funding.
- 6.3 Show how potential express toll lane strategies and improvements will significantly improve quality of life and travel time reliability and conditions for all Corridor users.

7.0 Tactics

Engagement activities during Phase 2 are designed to produce an ongoing dialog with project stakeholders and audiences described in **Section 4.0**. The dialog will provide them with timely, accurate project information and meaningful opportunities to provide specific, actionable feedback to the Project Team in alignment with the goals detailed in **Section 3.0** and strategies outlined in **Section 6.1**.

7.1 Project Advisory Group Meetings

HNTB will organize seven (7) PAG meetings prior to construction, typically associated with Project and/or NEPA decision points or milestones. The two-hour virtual meetings will enable the PAG to provide local input and perspectives on project issues and decisions and to serve as a sounding board for messaging and content to be presented to key audiences. (Face-to-face meetings will be added when allowed under federal, state and/or local COVID-19 guidance and regulation.) Meetings will include:



- 7.1.1 December 2 Meeting 1: Project Introduction-- Purpose; PAG role; Project Schedule; Engagement process; Baseline data.
- 7.1.2 January 26 Meeting 2: Project Scope & Costs-- (Ultimate vs. near-term project); Funding expectations; Initial ETL concepts; Preliminary toll policies, Concepts from US 69 corridor study; ETL Concepts from pre-planning analysis; Toll policy direction and responsibility matrix; Explain local contribution and expectations.
- 7.1.3 February 23 Meeting 3: ETL alternatives--Refined toll policies; Updated costs; Public feedback, changes in roadway section, access points, access type; Revised/more detailed toll policies; Input from OP City Council and community presentations.
- 7.1.4 March 30 Meeting 4: Preferred ETL configuration-- Anticipated toll rates; environmental impacts/considerations; Public/stakeholder feedback Preferred roadway configuration; Results from stated preference surveys; conservative grading limits, likely R/W needs, Key environmental impacts; Input from community presentations.

7.2 Stakeholder Meetings and Presentations

HNTB will conduct three tiers or categories of stakeholder meetings and presentations. Content will be tailored to advance project goals and to address specific needs of the groups in each category that will be generated by the focus of the groups, status of project progress and emerging issues or questions. These meetings will be designed to help elected and other community leaders to understand where the Project stands, how it might affect their constituents, levels of support or concern about Project decision



making among their constituents and what steps are being taken to mitigate concerns or strengthen support.

- 7.2.1. HNTB will schedule ≤24 presentations and listening sessions with Rotary, Kiwanis, Chambers of Commerce, Homeowners Associations, Businesses Groups and major corridor employers with significant numbers of employees drawn into the corridor from non-corridor locations.
 - <u>Purpose</u>: In addition to addressing their specific needs and interests, the meetings will be designed to leverage the communication channels these groups control to expand the communication and engagement reach of the Project to individuals and organizations that rely on the corridor but may be located elsewhere in the region.
- 7.2.2 HNTB will meet individually with ≤16 impacted or concerned stakeholder groups to present the project process, alternatives, and project impacts in order to discuss group- or location-specific concerns and clarify issues.
 - <u>Purpose</u>: These meetings will be designed, to the fullest extent possible, to anticipate and respond to concerns that might negatively affect the public dialog about the Project.
- 7.2.3 HNTB will prepare for ≤24 monthly or milestone presentations and updates with the Overland Park City Council, Johnson County Commission, KTA Board and State Finance Council as needed, as well as with other elected officials and groups where appropriate. For all briefings, meetings and presentations, HNTB will work with KDOT and its partners to identify presentational opportunities and develop pertinent agendas and materials, as well as handle logistical arrangements as needed.

Key Performance Indicators

- 1. Groups' self-assessment of meetings/process via periodic surveys
- 2. Secondary dissemination of Project information through communication channels groups individually control
- 3. Groups support for City of Overland Park ETL proposal

7.3 Public Meetings

HNTB will coordinate, promote and conduct five open-house public meetings associated with Project/NEPA milestones. It will recommend and produce upon KDOT approval associated meeting logistics and materials and monitor, analyze and report stakeholder attendance and feedback. All meetings will be organized to be held virtually with in-person accommodations provided where needed and appropriate within KDOT/CDC guidelines. The meetings will include:



- 7.3.1 January 20 Meeting 1: Purpose and Need; initial improvement concepts; T&R inputs
- 7.3.2 April Meeting 2: Alternatives evaluation and screening
- 7.3.3 September Meeting 3: Proposed Action/Draft EA
- 7.3.4 TBD Meeting 4: NEPA completion/Right-of-Way
- 7.3.5 TBD Meeting 5: Pre-Construction

Key Performance Indicators

- 1. Participant self-assessment of how welcoming, convenient and meaningful they found participation opportunities to be through periodic PIMA and website surveys.
- 2. Project Team assessment of how well attendees understand why the Project is being undertaken, its decision-making process, potential solution strategies under consideration and final choices made based on PIMA feedback tenor, specificity and actionability.
- 3. Project Team assessment of acceptance of express toll lanes as a solution based on PIMA, focus group and survey assessments.
- 4. Public levels of support for express toll lanes as reported by Advisory Group and local elected officials based on their constituent interactions.

7.4 Surveys and Focus Groups

Levels of stakeholder engagement, process understanding and satisfaction and support for ongoing Project decision making will be measured using several techniques. The opinion measurements will enable Project decision makers to monitor transportation users' perceptions of alternatives, knowledge gaps and messaging opportunities, as well as help inform other aspects of the engagement program:

- 7.4.1 Community opinion survey (~800 completed surveys)
- 7.4.2 One series of seven (7) focus groups (~≤70 participants)
- 7.4.3 One issue-specific quick response survey
- 7.4.4 Multiple single-issue electronic surveys conducted through the Project website

Key Performance Indicators

- 1. Participation levels.
- 2. Changes in Project knowledge, perceptions and ETL support over time.
- 3. Expressed public levels of support for express toll lanes.

7.5 Electronic Engagement

7.5.1 Website

The Project website will be positioned as the foundational platform for informing stakeholders about the Project. It will be updated weekly or more frequently to ensure stakeholders receive meaningful Project information; enjoy opportunities for substantive interaction and dialogue to occur between



them and the Project team; and create transparency in the Project and in the NEPA Process. To reach a wider, more diverse audience, the website display will be adaptive to the device it is viewed on; Section 508 compliant; and publicized and promoted via geofenced social media outreach and advertising.

- 2. Average session duration.
- 3. Changes in number of returning visitors.
- 4. Changes in number of unique visitors.
- 5. Abandonment rate.

7.5.2 Electronic Newsletters and Other Collateral

Monthly electronic newsletters will be prepared for target audiences to distribute project information and project status, with content tailored for inclusion in the monthly City of Overland Park electronic newsletter. Other additional outreach material will also be prepared which is not required to support specific engagement meetings. To leverage the impact of these materials, they will be repurposed and redistributed two to three times a week in various social media updates to broaden project understanding and to keep stakeholders engaged with the Project.

Key Performance Indicators

- 1. Number of subscribers versus unsubscribes.
- 2. Number of forwards.
- 3. Number and tenor of follow-up subscriber questions.

7.5.3 Social Media

Updates and informational graphics will be developed and distributed through Project and Project Partners social media outlets as audiences, content and timing dictate; usually two to three times a week on average. 69Express social media will focus primarily on Facebook, Twitter and Nextdoor as platforms extensively used by key corridor stakeholder groups. A Project-specific text messaging service will be set-up to share information about Project progress; but it is expected to be used more extensively as the Project transitions to construction and the need for immediate information updates (such as detours or delays) may grow. Social media will be monitored and responded to using HootSuite. As with the Project website, Project social media will be publicized and promoted via geofenced social media outreach and advertising. A social media posting content and schedule will be shared with the Project Engagement Team regularly, at least monthly if not more.



Key Performance Indicators

- 1. Number of impressions.
- 2. Number of shares.
- 3. Number of subscribers versus unsubscribes.
- 4. Number of unique viewers.

7.5.4 Visualizations

Two visualizations depicting the Corridor, anticipated growth and associated issues and potential solutions under consideration will be developed to help stakeholders visualize the complexity of the corridor, the potential solutions to issues and how issues and solutions affect stakeholders individually and as a community. The visualizations will combine 3D modeling, animation and still frame photography to provide "stationary" camera animations of each scene identified. HNTB will utilize camera matching technology to match the camera angle / perspective of the photographs taken on site.

Key Performance Indicators

- 1. Participant self-assessment of how convenient and meaningful they found visualizations to be.
- 2. Number of shares and forwards.
- 3. Number and tenor of comments.

7.6 Media Outreach

The Project's engagement-related media outreach will create a positive public perception of – and conversation about – the Project and the roles of the Project Partners. This will be accomplished by conveying messaging, content and feedback opportunities underscoring engagement process transparency and Project benefits delivered locally, regionally and for the state. Elements will include:

- 7.6.1 Media handbook for the Project Team outlining the process and protocols for discussing the Project with traditional and social media outlets.
- 7.6.2 Formal media kit describing the Project, Project Partners, process and progress to date, Project rationale and engagement opportunities.
- 7.6.3 ≤24 media releases or advisories to mark Project and NEPA milestones or other significant Project-related issues or events as appropriate.
- 7.6.4 Media monitoring and analysis, along with recommendations regarding responses, if needed, and development or revision of Project materials to improve amount or tenor of coverage.

Key Performance Indicators

- 1. Number and tenor of Project coverage.
- 2. Size of reach into total potential Corridor audience.
- 3. Changes in amount of engagement with the Project website based on specific coverage.
- 4. Number and tenor of coverage of Project Partners by local and regional media.



8.0 Schedule

Engagement activities will be scheduled in association with Project milestones and emerging information needs or stakeholder engagement issues identified in real time. Engagement activities will be initially scheduled in six-month blocks (see *Table 1*) based on need and content focus, then refined and extended weekly. The social media schedule will be provided in advance of project milestones and will be expanded into a rolling fortnightly "look-ahead" schedule organized around project milestones, emerging stakeholder questions and the specific needs of social media platforms as the 69Express presence expands on Twitter, Facebook and Nextdoor.

9.0 Engagement Protocols and Guidelines

To ensure consistency and effectiveness in engagement activities, the following protocols and guidelines are proposed to govern how, when and by whom engagement content will be produced, reviewed, approved and disseminated.

9.1 Program Oversight, Roles and Responsibilities

KDOT will oversee all engagement program decision making in collaboration with the Project Partners. The HNTB Engagement Team will implement that decision making as well as be responsible for anticipating engagement needs and recommending potential courses of action to KDOT for approval. All proposed actions and content will integrate with and support the successful implementation of the KDOT Project Communication Plan.

9.2 Engagement Plan Implementation

The HNTB Engagement Team will develop content and implementation steps for all elements of the Engagement Plan. These will go through reviews and approvals as determined by Ann Melton, KDOT Community Relations Manager, and may include (but not be limited to):

- Project Partners
 - o KTA Rachel Bell, Director of Business Services and Customer Relations
 - o OVP Sean Reilly, Communications Manager
- Steve Rockers, KDOT U.S. 69 Project Manager
- Lindsey Douglas, Deputy Secretary of Transportation
- Julie Lorenz, Secretary of Transportation

Content will be developed in alignment with KDOT direction, the KDOT Project Communication Plan and the Project's editorial and graphic guidelines (see attached).

9.3 Traditional Media

Media relations and responses will be handled by KDOT unless HNTB is requested to handle. If HNTB handles such matters, it will do so in alignment with KDOT direction and the KDOT Project Communication Plan. Kelly Kultala, as the KDOT District 1 Public Affairs Manager, will take the lead on media responses related to U.S. 69.

9.4 Social Media

It will be important to engage with our community on social media in a timely manner by responding to comments and questions, liking posts, sharing valuable content and overall fulfilling the needs of our online audience. To facilitate this process, HNTB will tier social media into three levels as follows:



Level I

Non-controversial social media questions or events that require a response and for which there is existing approved content will be handled by HNTB, including on monitored non-Project social media. KDOT's social media comment policy will serve as guidance for the Project's social media users community and standards of behavior.

Level 2

Social media questions or events that require a response and for which there is no existing approved content will be handled by HNTB in consultation with KDOT and Project Partners as appropriate. HNTB will within 24 hours formulate and recommend an answer and/or response to KDOT for approval. The recommendation will be based on Project Goals, prior KDOT direction, contemporary best practices and guidance found in the most current edition of the <u>AASHTO State DOT Social Media Survey</u>. It will be implemented upon KDOT approval as soon as practicable.

Level 3

In the case of controversial social media questions or events that do not fit the criteria for Levels 1-2, HNTB will convene a **Rapid Response Team** the same day as the occurrence comes to light to formulate and recommend an appropriate course of action. The Rapid Response Team will consist of such people as KDOT requires, but for this plan is assumed to be initially composed of as many of the following individuals as can be gathered together for immediate consultation:

- Ann Melton, KDOT Community Relations Manager
- Robyn Arthur, HNTB Environment and Engagement Director
- Michael DeMent, Engagement Task Lead
- Suze Parker, Parker Communications Group
- Michaela Pearce, Pearce PR & Marketing
- Mary Birch, Lathrop GPM

This group will be tasked with developing real- and near-real-time responses for KDOT approval to social media-driven questions, comments and concerns in order to pre-empt or mitigate emerging issues before they can affect Project progress or to better advise Project decision makers as to potential changes in Project processes and decision making.

1. Summary Guidance

a. Project Name

- i. 69Express is the branded name for the U.S. 69 Modernization and Expansion Project and should be used in all communication products.
- ii. When necessary to use U.S. 69 Modernization and Expansion Project, it should be when possible presented as U.S. 69 Modernization and Expansion Project (publicly branded as 69Express).

b. Logos

- i. The 69Express logo should be placed prominently, with an accompanying use of the KDOT logo appropriately located based on use and audience.
- ii. When Project Partner logos are used together, the sequence/hierarchy of placement is: KDOT, KTA and the City of Overland Park.

c. Fonts

- Gotham fonts are the primary project typefaces. Other fonts may be used for a variety of purposes as noted in the included US69ExpressBrandGuidelines.
- ii. Calibri is the preferred substitute when Gotham fonts are not available or appropriate for the proposed use.

d. Project Team organizations

i. Project Team organizations may have specific branding requirements in addition to what are contained here. When in doubt, check with the specific organization(s).

- i. Additional direction on graphic uses can be found in the attached US69ExpressBrandGuidelines FNL.PDF.
- **ii.** Editorial guidance not addressed in this document shall be resolved by referring to the following sources in the order shown:

a. Acronyms Starter Lists

b. Capitalization

Capitals are used for two basic purposes: to mark a beginning (as of a sentence) and to indicate a proper noun, pronoun, or adjective.

- <u>Do</u> capitalize the initial letter of the first word of:
 - Every sentence;
 - A direct quotation (e.g., According to the report, "Displacement of businesses and houses would be mitigated by relocation.");
 - Each bullet or number in a list;
 - Each word in a title or heading (except conjunctions, prepositions and articles (e.g., Natural Environment Study and Biological Assessment);
 - Professional titles preceding a name and not separated by a comma (e.g., Vice President Carol Jones [but Carol Jones, vice president]); or
 - o Proper nouns, pronouns, and adjectives (i.e., names, geographical locations, agencies or organizations, events, months, days of the week, holidays).
 - Words that by common HNTB/AEC industry practice are capitalized despite AP Style guidance: Advisory Group; Client; Consultant; Environmental Assessment; Project; Project Advisory Group; Project Team; Study; Study Area; and Study Team. Terms other than these should not be capitalized.

• <u>Don't</u> capitalize:

- The words government, city, county, state, or federal when used generically (e.g., county agencies, but Orange County; funded by the City of Honolulu,);
- Seasons of the year;





- o The abbreviations a.m. or p.m.; or
- Professional titles separated from a name by a comma (e.g., James Halliday, senior energy planner; data from the analyst, Laura Marks).

c. Dates

Dates should be treated as follows:

- Do not use ordinal numbers in dates, such as July 3rd, Aug. 1st; use July 3, Aug. 1.
- Spell out days of the week.
- Punctuate dates as follows:
 - o The event will be held in February.
 - o The event will be held Feb. 22.
 - o The event occurred in February 2010. (No comma between month and year.)

d. Lists

When using a list in a document, provide a lead-in phrase to introduce the list and its significance, followed by a colon:

- Using parallel construction (each bullet starts the same see below);
- Punctuating lists in specific ways; and
- Treating bulleted lists in tables differently from the body text of a document.

Parallel construction of bullet points involves:

- Capitalizing the first word of each bullet;
- Treating list items as either all sentences or all sentence fragments; and
- Starting each with the same speech part (verb, noun) if it's a sentence fragment.

Lists should be punctuated in specific ways:

- Complete sentence bullet points should end with proper punctuation (Example 1).
- Bullet points that are verb-based fragments end in semicolons (Example 2) with a conjunction before the final bullet point.
- Bullets (noun-based fragments) do not use ending punctuation (Example 3).
- Bullets in a table or text box do not require ending punctuation.



Example 1 (sentence-based list):

Our clients benefit from our efforts because:

- We help improve the infrastructure of transportation agencies across the country.
- We operate in Kansas City, Missouri.
- We provide innovative solutions to our clients.

Example 2 (verb-based fragments):

Our approach to the challenge is to:

- Use rigorous processes;
- Leverage best practices; and
- Follow 4for4 standards.

Example 3 (noun-based list):

HNTB employs smart people:

- Engineers
- Planners
- Architects

e. Numbers

- Spell out numerals less than 10, unless the numeral is for data with a unit of measure).
- Use figure for millions or billions. (e.g., 2 million, 54 billion).
- Use figure for percent (e.g., 1%, 67%).
- Include a zero before decimal amounts (e.g., 0.56).
- 24/7, not 24x7.
- For large, rounded figures, spell out "million" and "billion." Do not abbreviate large figures as "M," "MM," "B," or "k" in body text.
 - o Example: 56 million units (not 56M units, not 56,000,000 units)
 - o Example: 56,657,435
 - Example: 5 billion (not 5B)
 - o Example: 76,000 residents (not 76k residents)
- Do not repeat the word "dollars" after a dollar amount:
 - o Example: \$4.5 billion (not \$4.5 billion dollars)
- For amounts less than a dollar: \$0.50 or 50 cents (avoid ¢ symbol in body text)



f. Punctuation

Comma

• In a series of three or more terms, use a comma after each term but not before the conjunction (e.g., red, white and blue).

Dash

- em dash (—)
 - o Use an em dash to separate parts of a sentence.
 - Use a space before and after the em dash.
- en dash (-)
 - Use an en dash to connect numbers and dates in a range.
 - Do not use a space before or after the en dash.

Parentheses

- If a parenthetic expression is an independent sentence, its first word should be capitalized and the period (or other punctuation) should be included inside the parenthesis. (This sentence is an example of how an independent parenthetic statement should look.)
- If a parenthetic expression occurs within a sentence, (even if it could stand alone as an independent sentence), it is not capitalized and no period is placed inside the parenthesis; however, a question mark or an exclamation point may be used (just like the parenthetic statements in this sentence!).

Semicolon

• Use to separate phrases that contain commas (Portland, Oregon; Springfield, Illinois; and Savannah, Georgia).

g. Symbols

- Do not abbreviate a unit of measurement (unless used with a number), except in a space-limited table or figure.
- Spell out rather than abbreviate most words that are connected to numbers using hyphens; e.g., 6-foot gap (not 6-ft, not 6"); 12-meter cargo bay (not 12-m); 3.25-inch pipe (not 3.25-in).





- Use a non-breaking space (type Ctrl+Shift+Space) between the numeral and abbreviated unit.
- Use the singular abbreviation for both the singular and plural units of measure (e.g., 1 lb., 20 lb.).

h. Tables and Figures

- Number tables and figures sequentially and by section above the graphic:
 - o Table 3-1. Past Performance Statistics for Development Program
 - o Figure 4-1. Project Team Organization
- Place captions below tables and figures.
- Do not use the words "table," "graph," or "chart" in captions.
- Make sure a table or figure appears near body text related to the same topic.

i. Team Voice/Firm Names

- When referring to a subconsultant, use the firm's full name and write all text in third person (e.g., "Acme Engineering is experienced in xyz.").
- After first occurrence in each section, use simplified firm name (e.g. "Acme").
- Use full firm name on forms or in signature blocks (e.g., "Acme Engineering, LLC")
- Avoid the possessive of firm name, if possible. For example:
 - Example: "The Acme Engineering management approach uses ..."
 - Example: "Our management approach uses ..."
- Lowercase variations such as the team, our team, the transition team, and others

j. Time

- Use a colon to separate minutes and hours, such as 9:30 a.m.
- Do not include a colon or zeroes if referring to an hour, such as 9 a.m.
- Keep a.m. and p.m. lowercase and use the periods.

k. Trademarks and Registered Names

- Use the registered symbol (*) or trademark symbol (™) in superscript after the name with no space before the symbol.
- Use the registered or trademark symbol only for the first use in each section.





I. Units of Measure

- Do not abbreviate a unit of measurement unless it is used in conjunction with a number, except in a space-limited table or figure
- Spell out rather than abbreviate most words that are connected to numbers by hyphens; e.g., 6-foot gap (not 6-ft, not 6"); 12-meter cargo bay (not 12-m); 3.25-inch pipe (not 3.25-in)
- However, for energy-related units (multiples of watts, volts, etc.), symbols are appropriate; e.g., 230 kV; 300 MW; 2,400 kWh
 - Use a non-breaking space (created by typing Ctrl+Shift+Space) between the numeral and abbreviated unit
- Use the singular abbreviation for both singular and plural units of (e.g., 1 lb, 20 lb).

3. Design Guidance

a. Color Treatments

There are three types of color to consider when dealing with 69Express documents, exhibits and other materials:

- CMYK or four color process is used in printing. CMYK refers to the four inks used: cyan, magenta, yellow and key (black).
- RGB is used reproduce color on electronic screens. RGB use red, green and blue in an additive fashion to create an array of colors visible on screens.
- Pantone or PMS is a color matching system that standardizes color reproduction.
 PMS has coated and uncoated variates. Pantone is universally recognized by printers around the world.

b. Logo Treatments

Logos are visible, tangible expressions of the project, its potential impact and the state's leadership. Client and project logos also provide a quick, visual cue for assuring project team members, stakeholders and others that the information being presented is authentic, credible and requires attention and action. As such, they should be used consistently and unaltered; only use artwork provided by the client or project team member organization. Do no change colors or dimensions. The logo originator can provide or approve alternate versions. Treat logos as follow.

c. Logo Usage

Public Documents

- Use the 69Express, KDOT, KTA, and City of Overland Park logos in this order and as appropriate on public documents (fact sheets, mailings, newsletters, etc.).
- Logos used and placement will depend upon document type, design, and layout.
- Internal or external Word documents should feature the 69Express logo in the header's right-hand corner.
- The HNTB logo should be used only when directed to do so by KDOT.

Project Team Documents

- The HNTB logo should be placed on meeting minutes and other internal project team documents and deliverables, along with the project logo.
- The KDOT logo generally will not be used on such documents unless KDOT or the Project Manager directs its use.

Unacceptable Uses

Project-related logos should not be:

- Linked or combined physically to other text or non-project logos;
- Made transparent where the background shows through or depicted using any other colors than the ones specified in original logo artwork or specifications; or





• Arched, rotated, distorted or otherwise physically depicted or distorted in any fashion other than in its original, trademarked fashion.

d. Tables

Tables are a convenient, frequently used tool for quickly summarizing and conveying important information. To maximize their effectiveness, tables should be created and formatted as follows (see example following guidance):

- Table column and row headers Column headers should be bottom and center aligned. Row headers should be top and left aligned. Text should be the same size or slightly larger than table text.
- Table colors Column header or row headers should be the cyan blue color listed in the "Color Treatments" section of this document. Text against the cyan blue color should be reverse text. "Kansas Gold" may be used to emphasize total rows or rows/columns that need attention.
- Table text Text should be top and left aligned.
- Table numbers Numbers should be top and right aligned as if appearing in a spreadsheet. Font should be Gotham Book and size no smaller than nine points.
- Text alignment Header and table content should be left aligned if text; if numerical, right align to make sure data lines up for easy reading and comparison. Use bold text only as needed to emphasize key points.
- Sources Sources should be cited at the foot of the table, typically in italics. Text noting sources should be two point sizes smaller than the table text but no smaller than nine points.
- Positioning Tables and their title blocks, headings and/or captions should appear as a single unit on the same page.

e. Typography

- Sans Serif: Gotham Gotham is the preferred sans serif font for the 69 Express brand. Calibri fonts are an acceptable substitute when Gotham is unavailable.
- **Serif: Times New Roman** use for short text components such as headlines or captions when font variety is desired or needed.

f. Document Formatting

Formatting should improve readers' subject understanding and their navigation through the document. It should be formatted simply and consistently throughout a document (unless special circumstances dictate otherwise) as follows:

- 1. Margins One inch on each side, top and bottom.
- 2. Headlines and headers Capitalize first word only; don't punctuate.
- 3. Paragraph formatting
 - a. Spacing

i. Before 0 pt.ii. After 6 pt.iii. Line spacing Multipleiv. At 1.15

v. Check Don't add space between paragraphs of the same style

b. Insert a line after a paragraph or table/figure if it improves readability.





- c. Lists (bullet or numbered)
 - i. Outline organization (numerical or alphabetical) is preferred over bullets to aid reader navigation/reference.
 - ii. Bulleted, alphabetical or numerical lists should be formatted as hanging indents as shown in this example.

4. Text

- a. Left justification only.
- b. Spaces after periods One space after periods.
- c. Spaces after semi-colons One space to signify shorter stop than for a period.
- 5. Other considerations
 - a. Header
 - i. Client name and/or logo is placed in the left-hand corner of the header.
 - ii. Project name and/or logo is placed in the right-hand corner of the header.
 - b. Footer
 - i. Project number, if needed, is placed in the left-hand corner of the footer.
 - ii. Document name is placed in the center of the footer.
 - iii. Page numbers are placed in the right-hand corner of the footer.
 - c. Exhibit Formatting




